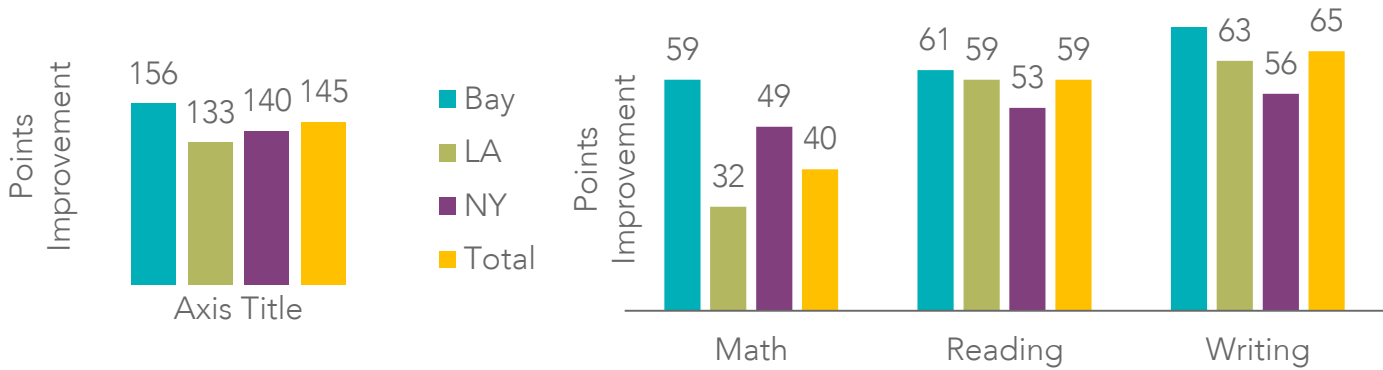

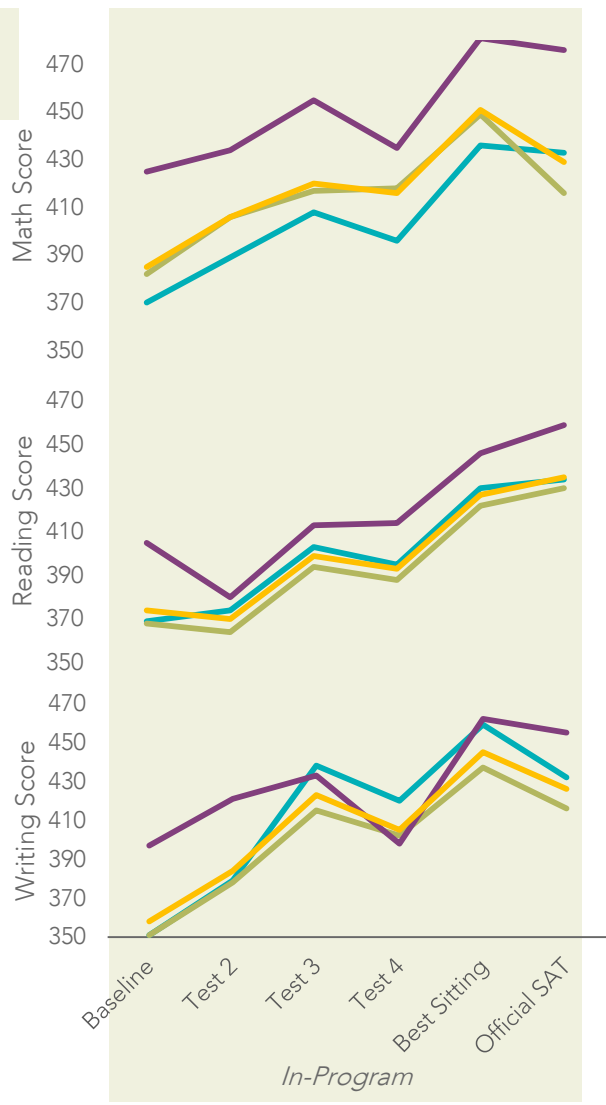
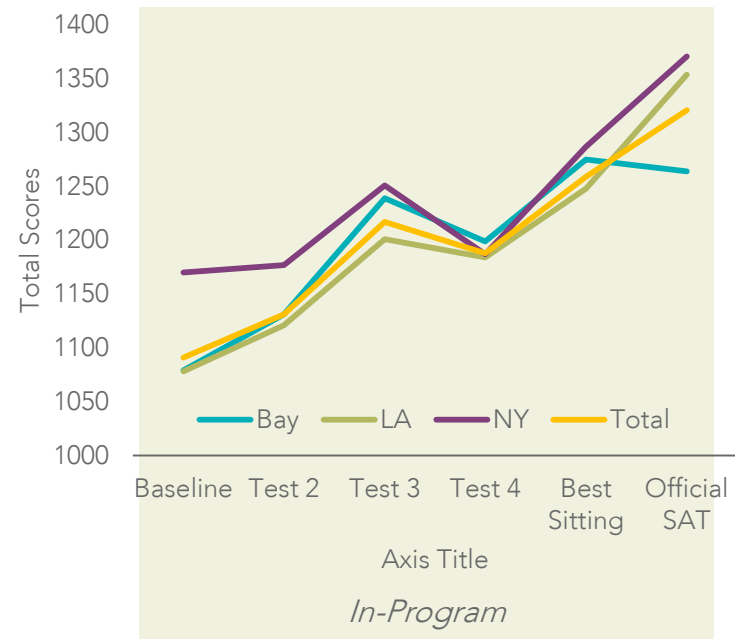
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Official SAT Performance

AYP 2014-15 (Class of 2016)



CollegeSpring students improved their actual SAT scores by an average of 145 points or 28%.



Student performance on DT4 drops off from DT3, but official SAT performance is higher than the best sitting score (agency wide average). This suggests that student learning in the program translates well to the official SAT. Of the content areas, reading performance on the official SAT is most similar to in-program performance.

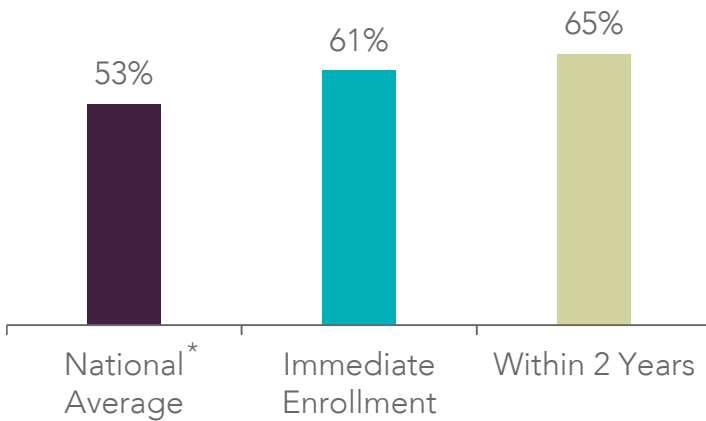

College Enrollment

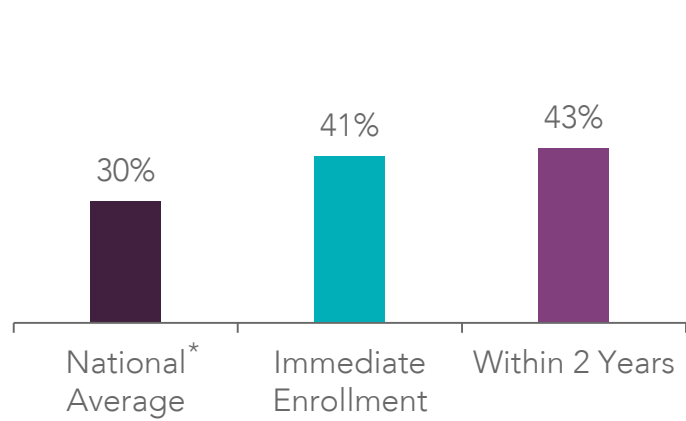
CollegeSpring students are 23% more likely to enroll in college within 2 years of high school than the national average for similar students.

CollegeSpring students are 43% more likely to enroll in a 4-year college within 2 years of high school than the national average for similar students.

College Enrollment Rates

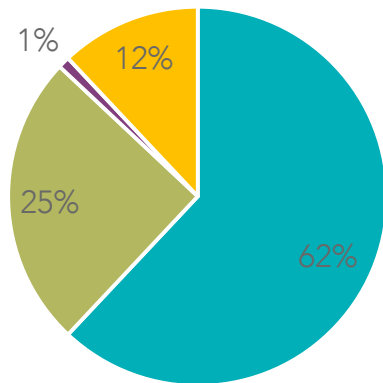


4-Year College Enrollment Rates



In-program experience matters
 For every additional 70 points of in-program SAT improvement, students have a **10% greater chance of enrolling in a 4-year college** within 2 years of high school.
 This is true for all students, regardless of baseline SAT score.

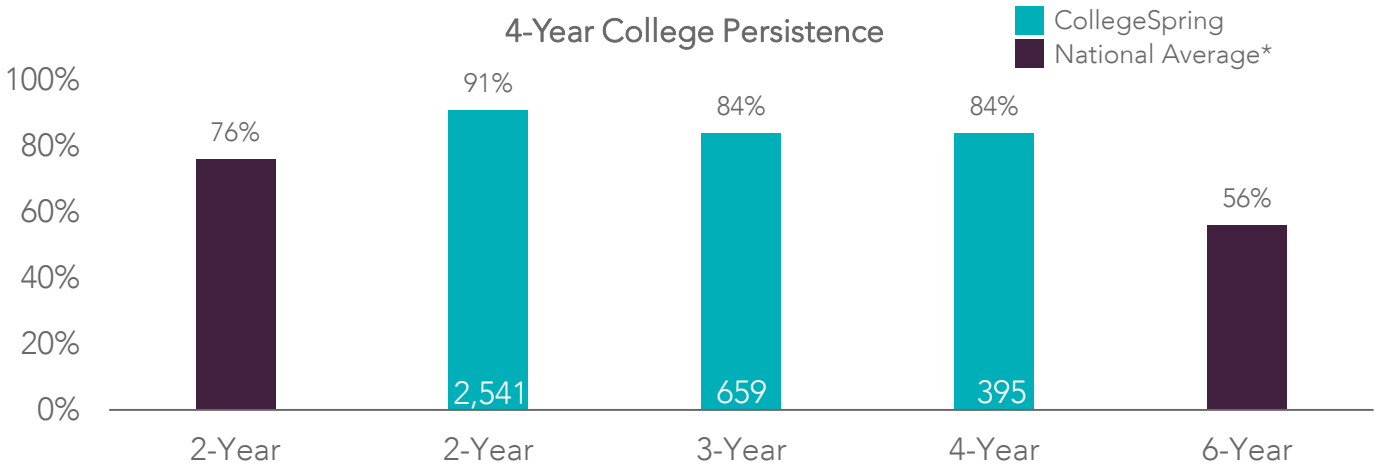
The table on the left describes the number and % of students for whom we tracked college enrollment, broken out by graduating class (cohort). We report tracking data on students who completed the CollegeSpring program for whom we can verify their birthdates with either 2+ sources or directly with partners; and whose reported birthdate falls within 2 years of average age for their grade level.

College Persistence & Transition

CollegeSpring students are 20% more likely to persist past the first year of college than the national average for similar students.

CollegeSpring students' 3- and 4- year persistence rates are higher than the average 2-year persistence rates for similar students.

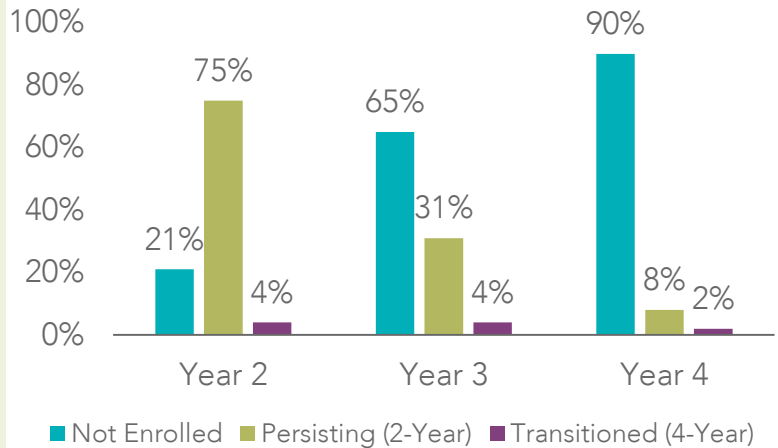


Students need help transitioning from 2-year colleges.

Of the 820 program completers who started in a 2-year college immediately out of high school, only 4% transitioned to a 4-year college full time within 4 years of graduating high school.

This data suggests that most CollegeSpring students who start at 2-year colleges either graduate from a 2-year college or drop out.
